Queen's Gambit (How To Play It, Attack It, And Counter It)

The queen (♙, ♚) is the most powerful piece in the game of chess, able to move any number of squares vertically, horizontally or diagonally. Each player starts the game with one queen, placed in the middle of the first rank next to the king. Because the queen is the strongest piece, a pawn is promoted to a queen in the vast majority of cases.

The Queen's Gambit is one of the oldest known chess openings. It was mentioned in the Göttingen manuscript of 1490 and was later analysed by masters such as Gioachino Greco in the 17th century. In the 18th century, it was recommended by Phillip Stamma and is sometimes known as the Aleppo Gambit in his honour.

The Queen's Indian is half of Aron Nimzovitch's conception of the center (the other half being the Nimzo-Indian). White refuses to allow the pin...Bb4 by playing 3.Nf3, and Black responds by fianchettoing the queen's-bishop - thus fighting for control of the center from a distance.

The queen is the most powerful piece. She can move in any one straight direction - forward, backward, sideways, or diagonally - as far as possible as long as she does not move through any of

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her own pieces. And, like with all pieces, if the queen captures an opponent's piece her move is over.

For a starter, I would recommend starting out: the queen's gambit by John Shaw or Chess Explained: The Queen's Gambit Declined by James Rizzitano. Or even just studying the QGD section in a one-volume tome such as Fundamental Chess Openings by Paul van der Sterren, which you could then also use as a primer for many other openings including the QI, Nimzo and Bogo-Indians, and many others.

Bringing the queen out means moving the queen to the centre or close enough to the opponent's pieces so it can be attacked by them. If you simply move or develop the queen in your own

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territory (as Caruana did in the game below), it does not count as "bringing it out".
